A Soldier's Diary Sinai 1967

A few days passed. The events that marked these days had to do with a few incidents with still retreating enemy platoons reports of patrols, visits and debates. If Jerusalem was beyond debate, there was still a large number of subjects to argu about. There was the Sinai – a wilderness perhaps, but i bordered on the Canal and had oil and manganese. It had Mount Sinai and Sharm el-Sheikh, it controlled the sea-traffi between Asia and Europe and Africa. There was the west ban of the Jordan, fully populated, but enjoying the natura border of the River Jordan. There were the heights of Syria with their preventive importance. Artillery fire was no longe a daily danger to lives and property in the valley settlements.

There was the Gaza Strip, an annexed, unnatural part of Egypt, populated mostly by the refugees. And there was the refugee problem.

No one answer or solution could be given for all these problems, but one thing was clear to all of us - the price we were to demand for returning these areas, or some of them, could not be less than the one thing we were after - Peace. And until peace negotiations began we could carry on as we were doing now. Strategically the new frontiers gave us an advantage, but economically they were a burden and a tremendous undertaking which, however, we believed we could cope with. Politically, we were beyond the position when any pressure exercised on us made us jump. 'We fought the war alone, we may have to fight the political war alone as well,' people were saying, and it was not going to be easy. The old frontiers were gone and history presented us with the chance of re-shaping the country, guided by justice and our rightful interest - we were not going to miss that chance.

I was 50 when I had my first show, so I was never on television with a short skirt or décolleté; I never tried to look or be younger. Maybe that's one secret. The accent, too. When I came to this country, people told me that if I wanted to teach and work here, I would have to take speech lessons to lose my accent. But it helped me greatly, because when people turned on the radio, they knew it was me. I was also very well trained—I was fortunate to work for seven years at Cornell with Helen Singer Kaplan, who wrote the most important textbook on sex therapy—and I was explicit in my answers.

There were 1,500,000 Jewish children killed during World War II. I was spared because, by chance, I was in Switzerland, not in Holland, Belgium, or France. People like me have an obligation to make a dent in society. Many of us became social workers, nurses, or counselors. I wanted to study medicine—impossible at first, because I didn't have a high school diploma, parents, or money. So I became a kindergarten teacher, which my grandmother had once said I should do because I was so short I could fit on those little chairs. I did that in Israel and Paris, and then I started to study psychology. I did not know that my eventual contribution to the world would be to talk about orgasms and erections, but I did know I had to do something for others to justify being alive.

The question remains as to whether, without an ideological motivation, the Holocaust would have happened. I think not.

I hope that my offspring here don't leave it, because that battered cliché is true: we have no other country, and don't have another people, screwed up though this one is. As Chaim Weizmann once said: This is the best

Jewish people we have got. We have to do what we can with it. I belong to this people despite the fact that, in principle, I find it hard to belong to any human group that will accept me as a member. But I did not choose to be Jewish, I was born into this business through no fault of my own. The truth is, I have not only made my peace with this, I am even happy about it. If you have to be born into some ethnic group, it's better to be born Jewish. It is a fascinating, annoying, disgusting, exciting, horrific, wonderful people.

Peoples of the past, it has been ironically observed, did not live as self-consciously as we do—they did not even know whether they were living in the fifth or fourth century B.C.E. In contrast, we are distinctly conscious of our place in history, and undoubtedly this consciousness derives from a profound sense of being witness to a radically new era in human history. Heralded first in Western Europe, this new or modern period is marked by far-reaching transformations in almost every aspect of human culture. For the modern Jew this consciousness of history is perhaps even more pronounced than it is for others—if for no other reason than that the Jew's entry into the modern world was marked by a radical, sudden break with the past. Western Jews "did not enter modern European [and American] society in a long process of 'endogenous' gestation and growth, but they plunged into it as the ghetto walls were breached, with a bang, though not without prolonged whimpers."

These whimpers express the modern Jew's bewilderment. Beyond the walls of the ghetto and the precincts of the Pale, the Jews found horizons that led them far from the world of their grandfathers. The modern, secular world has granted the Jews equality and has opened before them undreamt of opportunities for intellectual and personal development—opportunities that have immeasurably enriched the Jews. Moreover, the modern world has encouraged the development of new and rewarding forms of Jewish self-expression and collective organization. Yet this same new era has been for many Jews a veritable purgatory: in the Jews' passage through modernity their religion, culture and identity have suffered severely, and, tragically, they have borne the brunt of the most demonic enemies of modernity, the anti-Semites, who, eventually, leading an apocalyptic war to dismantle the modern

world—or at least what in their eyes were its most egregious features, democracy and Jewish emancipation—unleashed a Holocaust that devoured a third of the Jewish people. This trauma, in consonance with the contradictory rhythms of modern Jewish history, was quickly followed by the rebirth of the State of Israel and a renewal of Jewish pride and sense of community.
